

DELTA PSI ANNOUNCES \$1.5 MILLION CAMPAIGN TO FUND CHAPTER HOUSE RENOVATIONS

Loyal Supporters Raise \$810,000



The Delta Psi chapter house is more than 100 years old, and the Arch Love addition is nearly four decades old. The house has served us well, and it has withstood decades of use but is in dire need of significant renovations. Fire safety regulations have reduced the legal live-in capacity by 10. While the alumni work sessions of the past five summers have gone a long way to fixing some of the most glaring issues, there are structural, systems, and design issues that cannot easily be fixed in a few weekends. A vibrant chapter at 58 Pinewoods needs a facility that is safe and comfortable, with proper study areas congruent with the expectations of students of this century and the new requirements dictated by the Institute. We can't expect to continue attracting the best leaders of tomorrow without upgrading our facilities.

When we joined Sigma Chi, we knew we would share the ongoing responsibility for our college home at 58 Pinewoods. Among those responsibilities is our financial responsibility for the chapter to flourish for another 60 years.

Over the last several years, a vision-driven group of Delta Psi alumni has worked diligently to develop a solid strategy to build a high-quality facility and to provide a living experience that truly promotes excellence, enabling us to continue attracting the best young men at RPI. Their hard work has resulted in increased alumni support and



programming for the chapter and a first-class design and plan for a major house renovation. With a very generous commitment from **Bill Pomeroy '66**, we have already raised more than \$810,000 toward our goal of \$1.5 million for the \$2.8 million renovation/expansion. With this strong early support, we are excited to kick off a major capital campaign to make this vision a reality.

We hope you are as excited about this project as we are. In the coming weeks, you will receive more information detailing the ways alumni have taken an active role in the chapter and how you can become involved in our mentoring programs and in our capital campaign.

Sigma Chi has always been the place where we develop and promote friendship and brotherhood, but we also train boys to become men, encouraging them to excel in all that they do. It's an experience one can't get living in a dormitory or an apartment. Think what your experience at 58 Pinewoods meant to your growth and development, and you'll remember why it is our turn to support the next generation of Sigs.

We hope you will take a moment to reflect on what Sigma Chi means to you and join our growing list of loyal supporters who wish to ensure the lasting impact of the Delta Psi experience on the lives of men at 58 Pinewoods.

Delta Psi Wins Coveted Peterson Award

At the Balfour Leadership Training Workshop in July, the Sigma Chi Foundation announced that the Delta Psi Chapter had been selected as one of 38 chapters to receive the Peterson Significant Chapter Award for the 2009-10 school year.

Named for past Grand Consul **J. Dwight Peterson**, *Lambda '19*, the award recognizes superior performance in 11 areas of chapter operations,

including scholarship, financial stability, chapter and member character and reputation, campus activities and leadership, community service, faculty and alumni relations, pledge programs, and use of the Ritual.

The Peterson Award was established in 1963, and this marks the sixth time Delta Psi has received this honor. The other years were 1982-83, 1986-87, 1994-95, 1995-96, and 1996-97.

New Study Space Will Help Members Attain Academic Goals

Anticipating a year filled with milestones for the Delta Psi Chapter of Sigma Chi Fraternity, I write this letter with humility and great excitement. I am blessed to be involved in an organization that exists and thrives because of alumni support.

We will drive the capital campaign by showing alumni the dedication of our active members and by building on our past successes. Last summer, our chapter was awarded the Peterson Award, a five-star status, and the first place Risk Management Foundation award for outstanding risk management for the second consecutive year.

Last spring, we set a goal to improve our scholastic achievement. In our persistent endeavors toward that goal, we turned a large room beneath the living room in the basement (used as the Cave bedroom 35 years ago) into a fully finished study room during this year's presemester work party. The project included the installation of a new acoustic ceiling, improved lighting, an in-wall heater, and computer networking. Interest income from the Arch Love Scholarship Fund helped us purchase study tables and chairs, lounge chairs, a white-board, and a printer.

The resulting private, quiet room includes three separate work areas with tables and eight desk chairs, allowing brothers to work together as necessary on projects and to facilitate tutoring. In addition, there is a separate area with four soft lounge chairs. Almost every night all chairs are occupied. As one brother said shortly after school began, "I think more people have been in the study room doing work in the three

A Man Is Only As Good As His Word

Spotlight on Bill Pomeroy '66

Palo Alto, California, 1969. While working for IBM, as yet unaware of the professional eminence ahead of him, William G. Pomeroy Jr. '66 stumbled across an advertisement that read: "A man is only as good as his word. I'll do what I say I will do. I'll deliver on time!" Though the company responsible for the ad has long been forgotten, Bill cut out the passage and has posted it in his office ever since. The bedraggled piece of paper has served as Bill's daily reminder over the years to work with integrity and enthusiasm. Judging by the immense success he has met, those words are good advice to follow.

Bill's career has come a long way since his days at IBM. After taking a two-year hiatus from the corporate world for a South American adventure in a VW bus, he returned to the U.S. and the computer industry and founded CABLExpress Corporation in 1978. Thirty-two years and a name change later, CXtec is a \$100 million enterprise helping customers reduce the cost of their networking infrastructure and has fathered a spinoff company, TERACAI. For his efforts, Bill has won an abundance of awards, including entrepreneur of the year honors from RPI, Ernst & Young, and Syracuse University. And all this from the man who was happy to leave the pressure of college because "it seemed most everyone else was smarter."

Bill's collegiate years weren't all bad, he admits. The brotherhood of Delta Psi and the Sigma Chi Creed made an impression on him, and the time he spent at 58 Pinewoods holds some of his most precious memories. Among the highlights: being elected GOP by the 1963 pledge class and his inaugural toss into Ida Lake; dubbing the front study room he shared with **George Reynolds '66** and **Steve Matthews '66** the "small bore range" in 1963, a title that has stood the test of time despite name spelling changes; and Thumper and sing-alongs with **Rod Blumenau '65** at the piano.

Bill is grateful for the life lessons he gained as a Delta Psi as well as the camaraderie. He advises undergraduates to volunteer for offices within the chapter. "It will help build your ability to lead in the future." Bill served as historian and assistant house manager, "not really big roles," he concedes, "but they helped me learn. You can lead, follow, or just get out of the way." Bill has decidedly chosen the former. In addition to heading one of the best companies to work for in America, he serves on a variety of community and national boards ranging from historical societies to the Salvation Army.

Greater than any of his accomplishments, though, is his triumph over AML. Bill was diagnosed with the aggressive form of leukemia on October 19, 2004. Thanks to a superb team of doctors and a stem cell transplant in May 2005, he has not only survived, but his donor's stem cells have completely taken over his bone marrow. With his new perspective on life, Bill established the William G. Pomeroy Foundation to help other patients find a bone marrow donor match, the key element that saved his life.

Now fully recovered, Bill has been able to return to his favorite hobbies. Amateur radio has served as his outlet for years, but for the past decade ancestry research has been competing for his free time. He and his wife, Sandra, live in Syracuse, New York. Contact Bill at bpomeroy@cxtec.com.

Edward R. Miller '58 passed on to Chapter Eternal on March 31 after a battle with prostate cancer.

Alfred "Ding" Arbeiter '72 entered Chapter Eternal on June 16 after suffering from Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (Lou Gehrig's disease). He is survived by his twin brother, Herb "Dewey" Arbeiter '72.

Ding was active in ΣX sports at RPI and regularly attended Delta Psi alumni functions after graduation, including 34 Belmont Stakes, five Great Southern trips to Florida, and six **Ken Sullivan '73** Memorial Golf Tournaments in York, Maine.

Ding and Dewey partnered with **Bob "Ruff" Hutnick '71** to buy a 30-foot boat after college, which they named In Hoc. Ruff led an effort to collect funds to help defray Ding's medical costs during his ALS battle. Last spring, a group of Sigs presented Ding and his wife, Jane, with a check for \$6,149.54.

Ding was a good man and a great friend. He loved to play basketball and tennis and now has a prime seat for his beloved World Cup, NBA Finals, and every other sporting event on the globe. We will miss him, especially his smiling face.

Anthony "Rusty" Potts III '78 passed on to Chapter Eternal on July 9 after a nine-year struggle with Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (Lou Gehrig's disease). Jon Merz '78 led a group of Sigs to honor Rusty's life at the funeral services in Media, Pa.


