Delta Psi Celebrates Homecoming and 65th Anniversary Join Us at Pomeroy Chapter House October 2-4

t's that time—our 65th Anniversary Party to celebrate Delta Psi's founding in 1950. We are celebrating our anniversary during RPI's Homecoming in October because of the better weather than during December. We will begin with refreshments on Friday, October 2, at the Pomeroy Chapter House (PCH) at 58 Pinewoods from 3 p.m. to 11 p.m. Dinner is on your own Friday.

On Saturday, October 3, Delta Psi will be hosting a tailgate party on campus prior to the RPI football game at 11 a.m. Last year the chapter got a prime spot next to the entrance and had a hot dog/hamburger stand set up and raised \$500 for the Huntsman Cancer Foundation. The RPI football game is from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. While the football game is being played, we will be filming alumni for two videos; one on the history of Delta Psi and a second video for recruitment. The videos will highlight alumni involvement in Delta Psi, life at Delta Psi during the 1950s

through 2010s, and Sigma Chi alumni responsibilities after graduation. Filming will take place in the Robert "Justa" Eckart Study Room just off the dining room. Post-game/pre-dinner refreshments will be served at the Pomeroy Chapter House from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m.

At 5 p.m. there will be the unveiling of seven Delta Psi Sigma Chi plaques, one for each Delta Psi alumnus who has been selected for the Order of Constantine. An abbreviated White Rose Ceremony will follow for those Delta Psi alumni who have recently entered Chapter Eternal, including **Les Cole '62** and **George R. "Earth" Wurm '71**. Dinner at the PCH will take place from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. Refreshments will resume at 7 p.m. and continue to 11 p.m. Oedipus and the Mothers, our Sigma Chi house band from the mid-'60s, will perform in the chapter room from 8 p.m. to 11 p.m. It is being billed as their last hurrah. I also encourage you to return to the PCH on Sunday, October 4, for

the formal ritual house meeting in the chapter room at 2 p.m.

Please consider coming to Homecoming '15 and encourage your classmates and friends to do the same. As I have personally learned this year from the sudden death of Brother Earth, life is short so we need to seize the day—Carpe diem. Cost for the weekend is \$50 per person, which covers refreshments on Friday and Saturday, and dinner at the PCH on Saturday night. I hope you can make it and that you urge your fellow brothers and friends to do the same.

House Corporation Keeps Pomeroy Chapter House in New Condition Renovations to Chapter House Begin in Summer, Continue throughout the Year

ast August, you elected **Ken Miller '80**, **Jim Campbell '70** and me (**John Pfaff '71**) to two-year terms on the Phi Epsilon Phi House Corporation. At our next official meeting, I was elected by the board as president, replacing **Bill Wurst '71**, who had ably led us as president for the previous nine years. We all owe Bill an enormous debt of gratitude. Ten years ago, Bill recognized how far the chapter had fallen. Because of his efforts and the other alumni he recruited, the Delta Psi Chapter has rebuilt itself with a \$2.8 million fraternity house, has won five Peterson Significant Chapter Awards, and is an RPI designated five-star fraternity. An amazing set of accomplishments in such a short time. Kudos Bill, from us all! As you can imagine, Bill remains involved and is a great resource for the board and myself.

Over the course of the last year, **Dan Zuber '10** has been our very able secretary. **Anu Srivastava '07** has bought a house and has had to resign from the board due to personal and business time constraints. Luckily, **Thom Kouletsis '76** has previous financial experience in volunteer nonprofit organizations and stepped in and is doing a great job.

According to our bylaws, **Thom Kouletsis '76**, **Dan Zuber '10**, **Bob Bedard '75**, and **Jim Rosetti '79** are up for reelection to the board at our annual meeting on August 21. I fully endorse their reelection and ask that each of you fill out the proxy form on page 6 and either mail it to Phi Epsilon Phi, P.O. Box 494, Averill Park, NY 12018, or e-mail it to dzuber321@gmail.com. **Please be diligent about this**, as we need about 90 votes—proxy or present—to have a quorum for the annual meeting.

The house corporation functions mainly as the landlord for the house. As such, we believe our primary duty is to try to keep the house as close as we can to "as new" condition. Over the past year, we have contracted with

Fiacco Brothers' Flooring to refinish the first-floor common areas during the summer, as we did the prior year. After a review with Tom Fiacco, we decided to do the front stairs and second-floor hallway every other year. Overall, Tom said that the wear and tear was very reasonable for a fraternity of 40-plus college students. Other contracts we have include a lawn mowing service, a lawn sprinkler service, a snow plowing service, a fire alarm monitoring service, a semiannual kitchen hood cleaning and inspection, annual fire alarm inspection, and annual internal sprinkler system inspection. In addition to these safety inspections (required by our insurance policies), RPI does an independent yearly inspection, which is part of our five-star competition.

This summer, we are replacing the temporary inexpensive roller shades in the bedrooms with commercial grade shades. We also bought towel bars for every bedroom, which we will install during our presemester work party August 21-23. Overall, our mechanical systems, water, HVAC, etc. have all been performing well and we keep a close eye on things like filter replacements (every 90 days).

We perform physical inspections of every room at the beginning, middle, and end of each semester to document the room condition and deduct any charges deemed necessary from each brother's security deposit. With this type of diligence, we feel confident our new house will stay in great condition for years to come. PINEWOODS EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION UPDATE

Professional Development Seminars to Return in the Fall

he Pinewoods Educational Foundation has been ramping up its educational activities. The Foundation awarded scholarships to undergraduate brothers of Delta Psi from the Arch Love Endowment, and awarded the Pinewoods Scholarship Trophy, along with \$1,000, to the RPI chapter of Phi Sigma Kappa for having the highest Greek GPA. Phi Sigma Kappa elected to spend \$500 on a printer and a video projector that connects to a laptop for presentations and give a \$500 scholarship payment to the brother who achieves the highest GPA for fall 2015 semester.

Three newly initiated brothers, Sam Doskicil '17, Ravi Panse '16, and Matt Heimlich '17, were awarded the Eckart Scholarship of \$500 each. All three posted perfect 4.0s for the semester. Congratulations to all of you!

The foundation delivered two professional development seminars at the chapter house during the spring semester that were open to the student body. The first was a course on hypothesis-based management decision

making, and the second was a course with role play workshops on presentation skills. These are just the beginning of a series of planned seminars intended to go beyond the rich academic content provided by RPI and extend that to life and career skills. These programs are an integral part of the reason for the foundation and are examples of the types of activities we must conduct as a tax-exempt charitable organization.

For the 2016 academic year, we are planning to do more collaboration with new leadership programs to be sponsored by RPI to get more leverage and broader attendance across campus. Some of the programs on tap for fall include a talk by Courtney Banghart, Princeton women's basketball coach and daughter of James Munger Banghart '69, who will speak about leadership. We will also conduct sessions on interview skills and financial management for young adults. For the spring semester, seminars will include a discussion of career options that undergraduates may not have considered yet.

The foundation remains in solid financial condition. We will remain in GOOD condition only if brothers who have outstanding pledges continue to HONOR their payment obligations against those pledges, enabling us pay off our construction bridge loan and fund the endowment for scholarships and the seminar programs. Please remember your obligations.

Finally, we are always in need of volunteers to assist with the development and delivery of the seminars for our undergraduates. These seminars have proven to be fun ways to connect with our brothers while we are providing valuable life skills. Please consider volunteering to assist in facilitating a session or help with content. Contact anyone on the foundation to get connected.

Last Female Resident Revisits 58 Pinewoods

Ruth Harvie Returns to Her Childhood Home 73 Years Later

uring April 2015 at Pomeroy Chapter House, 58 Pinewoods, Ruth Harvie revisited her home from 1942, which her father sold to the Phi Epsilon Phi Fraternity. John Pfaff '71, president of the Phi Epsilon Phi House Corporation, was present for this historic visit.

I was in town for a long weekend doing house corporation and other business. It happened to coincide with the chapter's spring alumni weekend, which draws mostly younger alumni.

Around 3 p.m., I was standing on the front porch talking with brothers Bob "Justa" Eckart '73, C-Ray Allshouse '70, who was on the east coast for business meetings, and Kurt VanWagenen **'86**, who was also in town for business from California. Larry Heininger '77 worked on digging a trench over the old driveway to continue the privet hedge in the front yard. A small car drove up to Larry with an old lady who spoke to him and he directed her to pull up to the curb. She got out of the car and walked up to the front porch and said hello to us, announcing that she was Ruth Harvie and that she had grown up at 58 Pinewoods. Her father was Dr. Peter Harvie, chief of surgery at Samaritan Hospital. He bought the house in 1929 and sold it to Phi Epsilon Phi in 1942, moving his family to a farm in Tamarack.

Ruth was smartly dressed, spry, and had a firm handshake. We learned that she was soon to be 87 and was in town to celebrate her 70th reunion at Emma Willard. She went to college at Russell Sage.

We proceeded to give her a tour. Or rather, she gave us a tour telling what the house looked like when she was growing up. As soon as she entered the front door, she asked about the grandfather clock. It turns out that her father had left that clock as a gift to the fraternity. We told her the sad story about the original clock, but then showed her our new clock given to us by **Bob Jones '73** and **Larry Mentz '68**.

She said the entrance hall, living room, and library were almost as she remembered. The wall where we used to sign in as pledges was one big book case and the library was wall-to-wall bookcases. The house was heated by coal, regularly causing fires in the living room and library fireplaces.

She confirmed that the kitchen entrance was opposite the first-floor bathroom with a pocket door, which we discovered when we renovated three years ago.

The front stairway is almost as it was with the exception of the new walls at the top for fire

protection. The first bedroom on the right (small bore range) was her brother's room. The next right side bedroom (land of giants) was hers, and she shared the connecting bath (sink and toilet) with him. Across the hall (the nursery) was her older sister's bedroom. The next room, which we used as a small bedroom, was originally a bathroom, and the next room (rogue's den) was the master bedroom. What we knew as the main head on the left side in the back was the master bathroom.

At the top of the back stairs, the bedroom to the left (consul's corner) was a servant's bedroom, as was the bedroom to the right over the back stairs (bride's room). The connecting bathroom was also for the servants.

We even went into the old basement, where she pointed out the window that was originally a coal chute and the area around the stairs that was the laundry room. Ruth told us that a woman came once a week to do their laundry. Just beyond the basement exit through the bulkhead, there was a walkway, just like we have now, but it was covered by a grape arbor going back to the garage.

She said there was a small orchard of about a dozen fruit trees on the property surrounding the house. She reminisced about the pine trees along the driveway and the beach trees in the side yard on the living room side. Ruth told us there was a handy man that lived above the garage, flower beds all along the back fence, and about half of the front porch was screened.

We have Ruth's e-mail address. She now lives in an independent living facility in Hanover, N.H. She said she would try to find some old family photos for us. As she left she was very excited and was looking forward to telling the rest of her family about her visit.
