# BROTHERS UNITE AT 58 PINEWOODS FOR HOUSE DEDICATION AND HOMECOMING

The renovated RPI Sigma Chi chapter house was formally dedicated as the Pomeroy Sigma Chi Chapter House at 58 Pinewoods, Saturday, October 4, 2013. Two formal sessions were held. In the morning session Sigma Chi Grand Consul **Mike Greenberg**, *Illinois Wesleyan* '82, led the Pomeroy chapter House public ritual dedication with our builder and architect, Troy public officials, and the many neighbors in attendance.

In the afternoon, Institute President Shirley Jackson and major benefactor **Bill Pomeroy '66** cut the blue ribbons gracing the front doors of the 110-year-old front entrance officially opening the Pomeroy Chapter House during RPI's Homecoming weekend.

Many other chapter leaders spoke during the two sessions held on the front-porch-turned-stage, with the audience seated on the front lawn. Cars whizzed by and the rain threatened, but nothing distracted the more than 160 alumni participating in the weekend festivities with undergraduate brothers, dates, wives,

and sweethearts in attendance, as the crowd of more than 300 overflowed the dinner tent on the east lawn (the former site of the 1972 Arch Love addition). Sigma Chi alumni at the RPI reunion was reported to be 20% of the total alumni in attendance.

The 1960s house band, Oedipus and the Mothers, performed in the new subterranean basement, musical sounds comfortably confined, a major design improvement of the three-story addition connected seamlessly to the original structure. In prior years, the live bands playing in the living room or the Love addition escaped the structures and disturbed the neighborhood. Active brothers, 48 who arrived back at 58 Pinewoods in August after a one-year renovation hiatus, provided alumni and guests tours of their new home.



### CONTINUING EXCELLENCE

With the completion of construction and the payment of all of our renovation bills, the capital campaign, *Building Our Bridge to ΣXcellence*, is now complete with the critical exception of the need to collect the remainder of the amounts pledged over time. This is critical to us because we took out a bridge loan through the Sigma Chi Foundation to cover future pledge payments while allowing construction to begin. So please be diligent in keeping to your payment schedules since our loan repayment depends on you!

The renovation of the chapter house was the largest and most visible part of our program and the mission of the Pinewoods Educational Foundation (PEF). That mission is to support and provide educational opportunities to young men at RPI. This includes funding attendance at Sigma Chi program such as Leadership Training Workshop and providing scholarships and developing and hosting our own educational and career-oriented programs for our brothers.

So the other very important part of our fundraising is an element that will continue indefinitely and that is raising contributions for the educational purposes of the PEF. All donations to the PEF are fully eligible for tax deductions since the PEF is a registered 501(c)(3) charitable organization.

We continue to ask all undergraduate initiates to make pledges to the PEF to help pay down the large mortgage and to support ongoing educational activities of the PEF (note that these are all payable over a five-year period after members graduate and get settled into full-time employment). We would also like to ask our alumni brothers to keep the PEF in mind for contributions to support its activities and to consider naming the PEF in your will. What a wonderful legacy to be able to leave!

### House Renovations Allow Jim Manocchi '75 to Reconnect with Delta Psi

Twelve years ago, Jim Manocchi '75 brought his freshman daughter, Amy, to RPI; and he saw the opportunity to resume involvement with Delta Psi again. The chapter was having difficulties and brothers from Jim's era were also beginning to reconnect with the chapter. "We were at points in our lives when we had more available and discretionary time and income that we could invest in the chapter to help ensure its continued success," says Jim. "A lot of the early connections were around summer work parties and off-campus alumni gatherings in Maine and Florida, where many of us realized how much we enjoyed each other."



In 2009, Jim's son, **Alex '12**, enrolled at RPI and pledged Delta Psi, so Jim's reasons to reconnect with the chapter continued to grow. "I had lot of reasons and opportunity to be at RPI and the chapter house, and so agreeing to lead the Options Development Committee to figure out what to do with the aging house, and then the fundraising campaign, was natural," shares Jim. "When Alex pledged and was initiated, it turned into a family affair. Little did I realize what I was getting in to!"

One of the most difficult times of the entire house renovation process was the day Jim met with the PEP board in Troy at the Heffner Alumni House to decide what to do about investing more in the chapter house. "We asked ourselves, do we try to raise the larger amount of money and get a big mortgage and build the house we really want, knowing that it was a stretch? Do we go more modest and save \$1 million? Or do we drop the whole idea as too risky given all of the Institute and social pressure," shares Jim. "It was tough, but we gathered our courage and decided to go for what we really wanted the house to be and never looked back."

Jim reflects on his last five years with the construction and fundraising committees and says it took more time than he realized—but it was rewarding work because he had so much fun reconnecting with his brothers and spending time with his son while feeling like he was giving back to the chapter. To alumni who have considered volunteering but haven't yet, Jim says there are always reasons to delay but those often become reasons to never get involved. "I'm sorry that I was away for so long. We all have great memories and experiences that shaped our lives and we want to pass them on to others. Do it while you can; you will get so much more than you put in!

"I would like to think that with all of the strong alumni involvement, the Educational Foundation, and a newly renovated house, the chapter is well positioned to remain a leader on campus. I hope that the actives seize this opportunity and make the most of it for themselves and that they follow the example of all the alumni that made this possible and make it even better for those who come after them," says Jim.

"I like a challenge, and this was a big one, but it turned into a great opportunity to connect and give back!" says Jim. "Having said that, I do believe that this will be the last fraternity house that I try to build. My big brother, **Bob Jones '73**, had a leading role in the construction of the 1971 addition, I worked on this one, but I will leave it to Alex to lead the next one!"


#### Homecoming Highlight

# Pinewoods Educational Foundation Plans Scholarship Increases

With the Pinewoods Educational Foundation (PEF) having successfully completed the *Building Our Bridge to \( \Sigma Xcellence*\), we are now focused on its educational mission and increasing the size and number of scholarships that can be awarded on an annual basis. The cost of attending RPI now exceeds \$60,000 per year. Currently, the PEF awards two to four scholarships annually and are averaging approximately \$1,000 a scholarship. The cash for these scholarships is based almost exclusively on a generous gift from **Arch Love '42** and is managed in an endowed fund by the Sigma Chi Foundation.

Arch's original intent was to award scholarships annually to leaders in the fraternity who have maintained a strong academic record and have demonstrated a strong commitment to the fraternity and charitable activities. There is an annual application process where the active member can explain his qualifications. The number of applications has been less than expected recently, as the number and amounts of the scholarship need to be expanded to encourage more applicants. Scholarships winners were announced at the Pinewoods Scholarship Dinner on March 5. The 2014 dinner was held at the Pomeroy Chapter House and will included invited RPI faculty.

In order to expand the amount of funds available for the scholarships, the PEF will be conducting a campaign later this year. To encourage more active interest in the scholarship program, the PEF is considering requiring that the chapter maintain an overall GPA that exceeds the all-men's or all-Greek GPAs before any scholarships are awarded.
